Food for thought: *The last will be first and the first will be last.* - Matthew 19:30 & 20:16

To some, this verse may read like a threat and to others a blessing. I suppose it depends on which end of the line you are living on at the moment. But today, I am reading it more as a command; a command for equality.

So often times we think that we are doing good enough by giving from our excess. But, the command is to create equality, not to allow inequality to continue. We tend to give from what we do not need, rather than giving what to fulfill the needs of another.

Understanding that not all of us could completely fulfill some of the needs that exist, the question I am posing is whether or not in our giving practices we truly sacrifice from what we have or if we simply give out of what is left over. Jesus calls us to join Him in being an advocate for global equality, not just out of our wallets, but out of our mouths as well. Advocating for equality takes both sincere words and actions.

The last will be first and the first will be last is a command to be a blessing to one another and ourselves. Advocating for equality means advocating for the relief of the burdens of wealth for the wealthy and relief of the burdens of poverty for the poor. We are blessed, in order to be a blessing to one another; in our time, talents and finances.

OUTREACH CORNER

The Bible Teaches Us How to Give

Many people are confused about giving. Some of our confusion comes from trying to apply what the world teaches us about money and possessions to our Christian giving. But the Bible has a lot to say about how we should give:

Give regularly – The Bible tells us that each individual Christian is responsible for giving on a regular basis...weekly or monthly, whenever you receive income.

Read 1 Corinthians 16:1-2

Give off the top – The Bible has a lot to say about our priorities. Loving and thanking God with our financial offering should come first...before the rent, the mortgage, the car payment, even food. Giving first is a sign of trust that is much more important than the amount we give.

Read Matthew 6:24-34.

Commit a percentage – How much should you give? 5%? 10%? 20%? 50%? Yes! The Biblical guideline is tithing (giving 10%), but the specific percentage is not as important as making a commitment. Start by committing any percentage of your income you feel comfortable with and gradually grow toward and beyond a tithe. Follow through on your commitment by setting aside this percentage every time you receive income and offer to God with joy and thanksgiving!

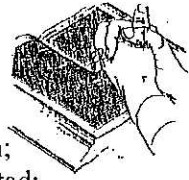
Read Mark 12:41-44.

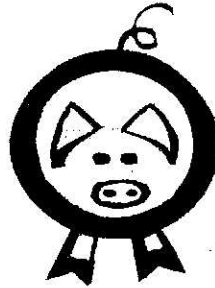

The secretary's report was presented as printed. Dave made a motion to accept as printed. Andy seconded. Motion carried.

The financial report was presented as printed. Pastor will call Benders to see about the check for Stephen's Ministry. NaDyne made a motion to accept the report as printed. Andy seconded. Motion carried.

Old business:

1. Joyce had 2 people respond about the custodian position. After discussion Dave made a motion to hire LaVon Meyers. Andy seconded. Motion carried.

REFORMATION – October 31

The Reformation was a period of great change in the history of the world. It was a time of great discoveries and an awakening of human potential. Inventors, scientists, musicians, and the Church were in a time of discovery and these discoveries led to the challenge of authority. Here are just a few facts about Martin Luther and the things that happened during the years 1450-1600.

- 1483 - Martin Luther was born in Eisleben, Germany.
- Luther's father wanted him to be a lawyer and Martin went to law school, but one day he was traveling in a storm and was almost hit by lightning. Martin prayed to St. Anne to save him and if he was saved he would become a priest.
- 1507 - Luther is ordained as a priest of Erfurt.
- 1510 - Luther was sent to Rome. He saw the corruption of the church.
- 1517 - Luther nails his *95 Thesis* to the door of the church in Wittenburg. It was the first public act that sparked the Reformation.
- 1521 – Luther stood before the Emperor and refused to recant his writings at the Diet of Worms. He went into hiding at the Wartburg Castle because his life was in danger. During this time he translated the Bible into German so people could read it.
- 1546 – Martin Luther died.

Harlan Backhaus found this letter in a box of his papers. It was a letter his parents received in 1947.
Giving to the church was a concern back in 1947, too!

Dear Member(s):

CRASH! BANG! INFLATION HAS HIT THE CHURCH!

At the Semi-annual Meeting of St. Peter Lutheran Church Sunday, May 11th, a resolution was passed instructing the Church Council to adopt some method of informing each family of the Parish concerning the Congregations's finances. Thus the purpose of this letter.

It is felt that the members of the Congregation are largely unaware of the fact, that, since regular contributions, in the past year, for current expenses, have not kept pace with the general economic rise and increased budget expenses, the treasury balance is decreasing sharply. This, you will agree, is an unhappy situation especially in these times.

Certainly the amazing financial response to the Building Program has been more than gratifying, but it must also be kept in mind that the annual expenditures likewise must be met. In some cases contributions have not been increased over the depression years of the '30's, while income has jumped decidedly. In some cases not enough....increase.

However, we know that once this situation is made known that those who have not as yet, and can, will gladly increase and adjust their contributions to meet the increased needs.

This will enable us at all times to meet our financial obligations fully and promptly, and to care for the incidental and miscellaneous expenses which occur yearly.

It is in your interest, in the interest of your Church, in the interest of true Christian Stewardship that the Congregation sends this letter to you. Kindly rethink in all sincerity your giving to God's Kingdom at Home and also Abroad. Give as God has blessed you. Thank you.
